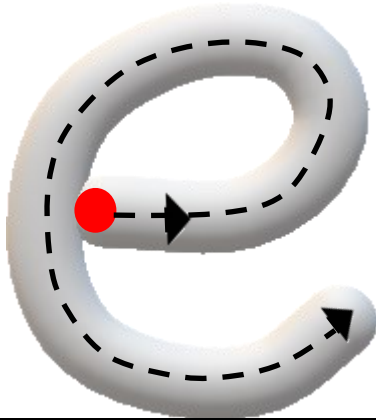

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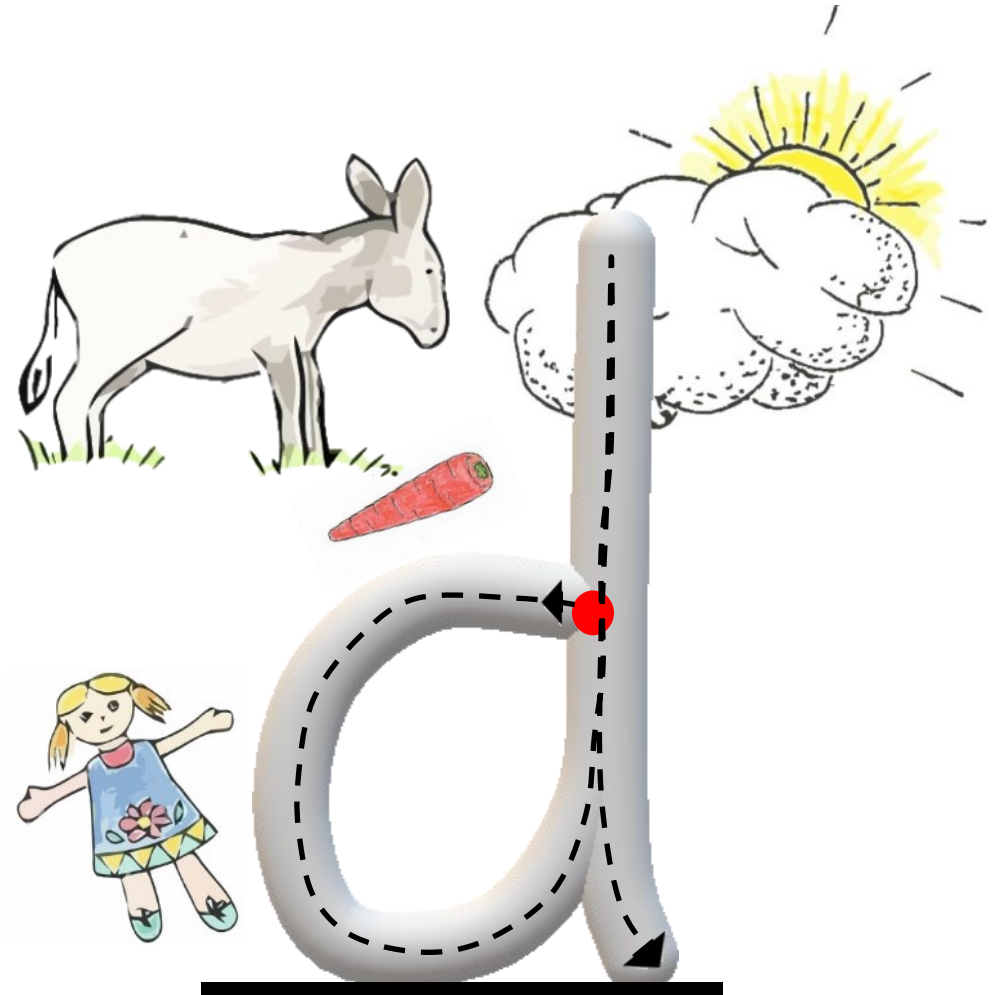

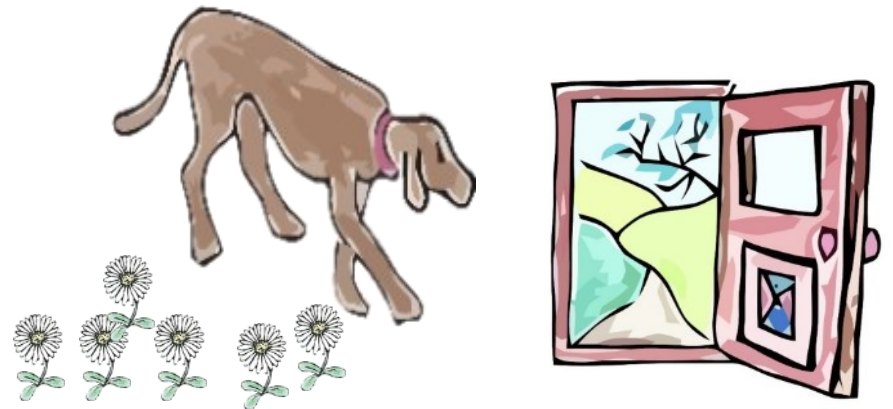
a: axe, apples, ants, ambulance, anchor, arrow

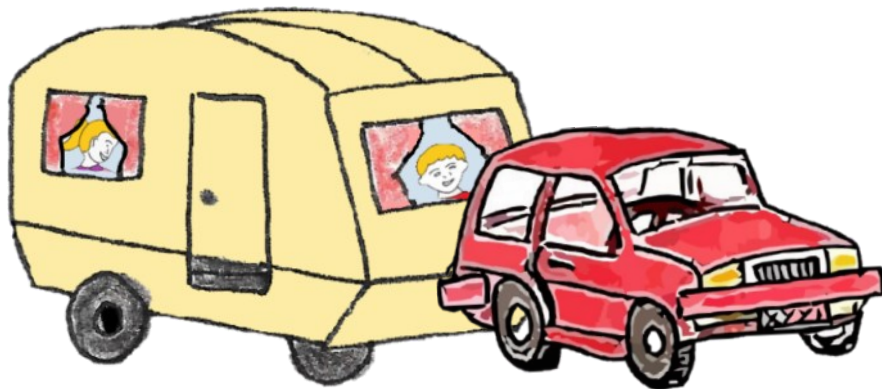
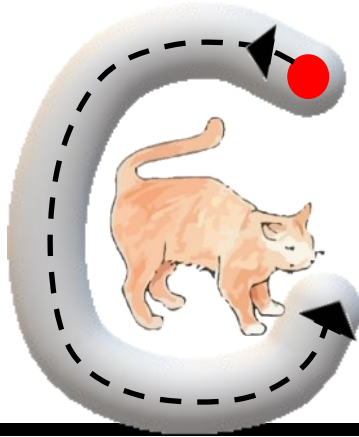
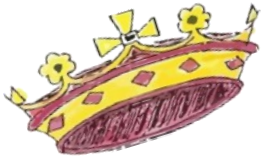
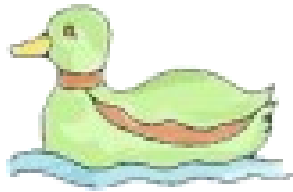
b: balloon, basket, ball, bucket, boat, boy, banana

## How to use this book:

1. For each letter, introduce the letter by saying its sound clearly and encouraging your child to say it with you.

2. Trace the letter.
3. Then find as many objects as you can that begin with that sound. You may find them anywhere on the double spread of pages.
4. Say the names of the objects and listen carefully to the first sound - the initial letter. E.g. 'buh' for ball. It sometimes helps to repeat the sound: bbbb-ball.
5. Praise your child and do not be discouraged if s/he does not succeed at first. Aim for the child to know the sound each letter makes while s/he learns to hear the initial sound of words.
6. Keep your ears open for anything else that begins with today's sound.
